# **SECTION A - PROPERTY DETAILS**

# **PROPERTY TENURE/TITLE**

The land, the subject of this report, is available Crown land that is Transferable Land (Aboriginal Land Amendment Regulation (No.4) 2006).

# PROPERTY DESCRIPTION

Lot 50 on SP190989, lot 51 on SP190992, lot 52 on SP190991, lot 53 on SP190990 and lot 29 on SP190994 parish of Keppel, county of Livingstone. These lands are located on Great Keppel Island, approximately 50km north east of Rockhampton. See locality map and plans at Attachment 1.

# AREA OF LAND

Lot 50 on SP190989 is 31.37ha Lot 51 on SP190992 is 38.73ha Lot 52 on SP190991 is 25.16ha Lot 53 on SP190990 is 75.54ha Lot 29 on SP190994 is 0.0642ha

Total area of land is 170.86 hectares

The lands, the subject of this report, have been surveyed and the relevant plans are considered appropriate for the purpose of this transfer.

# ACCESS

The lands, the subject of this report, have access deemed appropriate for the purpose of transfer.

# **SECTION B - RATIONALE**

It is the Minister's responsibility pursuant to sections 27 and 28 of the *Aboriginal Land Act 1991* (ALA), to direct that a Deed of Grant in fee simple be prepared in relation to transferable land and to appoint grantees for that transferable area.

Pursuant to section 12(e) of the ALA, available Crown land declared by regulation to be transferable land is transferable land.

The lands, the subject of this report was declared by regulation to be available Crown land that is transferable land on 27 October 2006. A copy of the regulation is appended as Attachment 2

# STATUTORY REQUIREMENT BEFORE APPOINTMENT OF GRANTEES

Section 28 of the ALA directs that before making any appointments of grantees, the Minister must consult with, and consider the views of, the group of Aboriginal people particularly concerned with the land and, as far as practicable, the Minister must make such appointments in accordance with any Aboriginal tradition applicable to the land.

This report documents the consultation done on the Minister's behalf with Aboriginal people particularly concerned with the land [See Section C - Consultation Methodology] and makes a recommendation to the Minister [See Section D - Recommendation].

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# SECTION C - CONSULTATION METHODOLOGY

# GENERAL

After lengthy public consultation with stakeholders, five parcels of unallocated State land on Great Keppel Island have been made available for transfer under the ALA. The land has cultural heritage values for the Aboriginal people connected to the land, the Woppaburra People.

The lands are within the area of land being claimed by the Darumbal people under the *Native Title Act 1993* (Cth) and in deference to the native title claimants, their consent was requested prior to the commencement of the formal consultation process for this transfer. The Gurang Land Council, being the official agent of the Darumbal people, was requested to convene a meeting of the claimants at which the transfer process and its implications could be outlined. At such a meeting held in Rockhampton on 19 October 2005 and attended by members of the Gurang Land Council and representatives of the claimants, approval was obtained for the transfer process to commence.

The Department facilitated two formal meetings during the consultation process. The first meeting was held at Hervey Bay on 16 and 17 September 2006, and the second was held in Brisbane on 18 November 2006. The Woppaburra People also held a number of meetings prior to these meetings. Details of the meetings and of the history of the Woppaburra People, prepared by them, is appended as Attachment 3.

The method of consultation has consisted of:

- discussions with individuals and small groups of people;
- telephone conversations;
- formal and semi-formal meetings;
- newspaper advertisements;
- written and electronic communication.

Departmental officers acknowledge and appreciate the advice and assistance of the Woppaburra People throughout the transfer/consultation process.

# **DETAILS OF FORMAL MEETINGS**

16 and 17 September 2006: The first formal meeting convened by departmental officers was held at Dhugamin CDEP Hall, Scrub Hill, Hervey Bay on 16 and 17 September 2006. At that meeting the transfer/consultation process was outlined, timelines were established and the provisions of the ALA and Regulation were outlined. The responsibilities of trustees under the Act and Regulation were explained, as were the processes of nominating and appointing grantees to become trustees of the land. On the second day of the meeting participants nominated the forty people listed below to represent the five main families connected to the land under Aboriginal tradition.

- The outcome of the advertisements calling for objections to the nominated grantees
- Name for the land on the deed
- Name for the land trust
- The constitution of the land trust
- Potential handover dates and arrangements

# ADVERTISEMENTS

Advertisements calling for objections to the nominated grantees were approved by the Manager, Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Land Acts Branch on 17 October 2006 and were placed in the Koori Mail on 25 October and the Cairns Post, Townsville Bulletin, Rockhampton Morning Bulletin, Mackay Daily Mercury and Fraser Coast Chronicle on 28 October 2006. With respect to all advertisements, objections were requested to be received in writing by 5:00 pm on 17 November 2006.

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# **OBJECTIONS**

An objection was put forward by sch4p4(6) Personal information in regard to the nominated grantees. At the meeting held on 18 November 2006, the nominated grantees and Woppaburra Elders felt sch4p4(6) Personal information did not have any traditional connection to the Great Keppel lands. sch4p4(6) Personal information has been informed of this and that the transfer is to proceed as planned.

The Woppaburra People HISTORICAL FACT SHEET

To our guests/visitors

Welcome to the Traditional land and sea country of the Woppaburra People - Keppel Islanders We hope you enjoy your visit with us, and walk our traditional country and see it through our eyes, culturally and spiritually.

Background Facts: Woppaburra People of the Keppel Islands

- Our ancestors have occupied these islands since time began, our dreamtime, today's descendants have a lifelong spiritual and physical connection to the land and sea, every living thing is connected through the circle of life. We have a life long responsibility to our ancestors to care for country. Through many vast generations of the Woppaburra people, our fore-fathers have passed down traditional knowledge, our knowledge of the islands is intimate, and is under-rated, all its natural resources, the seasons, the tidal and ocean movements, the flora and fauna, what used to be there.
- Our ancestors island hopped through the Keppels, based on seasons, food, water shelter and traditional hunting, conducting ceremonies, but the primary islands of occupation were North Keppel (Konomie – meaning 'North Wind') and Great Keppel (Wop-pa – meaning 'Woppa means island, burra means, people of the island').

Our Cultural Heritage Sites

Indigenous Sites of significance across Australia, form a strong case of physical evidence of 'occupation', for Australia's original inhabitants. We have sites on many of the islands, for example, one of our sites (a midden) on North Keppel has been dated as 4500-5000 years old, it is as big as three football fields.

Another priority site, is the (drowning cave - a massacre site), where our ancestors were chained to iron manacles at low tide as a form of punishment, and when the tides came in, they were drown, we want to have this site submitted to the National Heritage Register, as it has national significance of Australian historical importance and one of hundreds of examples across Australia, considered evidence, of the many atrocities that Indigenous people were victims of in early European /settlement.

15 years ago, we lodged an expression of interest for land acquisition on our ancestral lands, primarily, Great Keppel Island (USL). In March 2005, we were advised that the EOI was approved, but sadly, we have lost over 15

Elders in this time, and a priority for us is the health and well being of our current Elders who are suffering debilitating illness's, and we want to ensure that we don't lose anymore of our Elders in this lengthy government process and that they will witness the handover ceremony in their time.

As a traditional owner group, we always extend our hand of friendship and good will to everyone, and we continue to seek resources and assistance from other stakeholders and their generosity, as it is a life struggle for Indigenous groups to go forward and set a future for our young people and future generations as we try and revive our culture and traditions on ancestral lands - a step towards the National Reconciliation Agenda of COAG - 'Friendship builds Respect'.

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# WOPPABURRA HISTORICAL TIMELINE

#### European Settlement

- Pre 1770 Our ancestors lived in harmony and occupied the Keppel Islands for time millennium;
- Post 1770 The Keppel Islands first became known to the outside world on Sunday 27th May 1770, when Captain James Cook named Keppel Bay (after rear admiral Keppel) and the surrounding islands and observed people on them.
- Subsequently, several other coastal explorers observed people on the islands but provided no detailed descriptions of them or estimates of numbers.
- <u>1850's</u> marked a turning point in colonial activity on the mainland, and this was gradually to have significant repercussions for the Woppaburra People.
- 1853 Colonial frontier settlers Archer Brothers marked out Gracemere Station, south of now Rockhampton
- 1857 Rockhampton was born (comprising only two buildings)
- 1858 gold was discovered in Canoona
- 1860's To the North, Bowen and Townsville were settled.
- 1865 Yeppoon was settled
- 1867 Emu Park was settled
- <u>1865</u> The first recorded visit to the Keppel Islands occurred by a group of European settlers from the mainland.
- <u>1866</u> Robert Ross obtained a lease over South Keppel.
- <u>1867</u> Robert Ross visited South Keppel Island with a view to establishing a cattle station and for the first time offers a glimpse of the Woppaburra
- 1870's Colonial contact with the Keppel Islands developed on a more systematic basic
- 1883 and onward colonial reports and observations begin to reveal more details about the Woppaburra and the impacts of colonial settlement on their lifestyles, culture and survival start to emerge
- <u>1883 1902</u> After surviving many years of colonial settlement, after massacres and cruel and inhumane treatment at the hands of numerous lessee's on the islands, the number of Woppaburra are sadly reduced in numbers, from a possible 150 - 200, to only 17 Woppaburra, mainly women and children that are left.
- Most of our male ancestors were shot, and most of our women ancestors died of European disease
- 1902 The remaining 17 were forcibly removed and further separated by being sent to numerous Aboriginal missions in Queensland, Bogimbah Mission Fraser Island, Yarrabah and Cherbourg.
  - Only 6 Woppaburra survived the removal of 1902 (Konomie, Jessie, Albert, Annie, Fred)
- Today's descendants have direct blood lineage to those 6 who survived.
- Those last 17 never returned to their island home, until 1984, when today's descendants held a reunion. (to remember and pay our respect)
- Today's descendants approximately number over 600-800.

# Today's descendants - Historical Timeline

- 1984 the first reunion of Woppaburra descendants held on Great Keppel Island
- 1991 Expression of Interest (EOI) lodged for land acquisition on Great Keppel Island (Aboriginal Land Act 1991)
- 1993 Descendant Bob Muir stuck the Aboriginal flag in the sand on Great Keppel Island (Wop-pa), reclaiming our ancestral and traditional lands - 'our peaceful protest'
- 2000 First Burial Ceremony (Repatriation of our ancestors skeleton remains)
- 2001 Second Burial Ceremony (Repatriation of our ancestors skeleton remains)
- March 2005 OUR EOI for land acquisition IS APPROVED by the Dept of NR&M!!!! (this took 14 years from when we first lodged the EOI in 1991), pre Native Title Act. (We have lost a lot of Elders in this time, who sadly, aren't with us to witness this historic event)

### (Chris Doherty and Bob Muir facilitated all the workshops below)

# Government Compliance Process - Land Acquisition on Great Keppel Island (Wop-pa)

# Welcome and Opening

<sup>78B(2) of the RTI Act</sup> opened the meeting and welcomed everybody to Butchula country. Colleen thanked <sup>78B(2) of the RT</sup> and acknowledged and paid respect to the traditional owners of the land. She thanked the Butchula people for holding the meeting on their land at Scrub Hill, and acknowledged and paid respect all the elders present. She thanked everybody for coming, introduced the ATSILAB team members and also acknowledged the assistance of all those who had helped with the planning and arrangements for the meeting.

By consensus among participants, Bob Muir was appointed to chair the meeting.

In response to a request from the floor, he outlined his efforts, over the last 13 years, to have the land at Great Keppel Island handed over to Aboriginal people. Glenice Croft pointed out the work also done by others in the past -KILAC, Linette van Issum. Following animated discussion from the floor, Colleen responded acknowledging the great contributions made by several people over many years. Participants were requested to focus on what they were there to achieve - to be informed about the transfer of land at Great Keppel Island under the *Aboriginal Land Act 1991*, the consultation process and the nomination of Aboriginal trustees for the land.

# Identification of the Land

Colleen indicated the five parcels of land – Lot 50 on DP 190989, Lot 51 on DP 190992, Lot 29 On DP 190994, Lot 53 on DP190990, Lot 52 on DP 190991 to be transferred, on a large map. She explained that DP meant Deposited Plan as the survey plans had not yet been registered. She said that Rockhampton Office had advised that the survey plans would be registered on 16<sup>th</sup> October, and explained that the opening and closing of roads, and the native title notification process which that involved, had slowed down the registration of the survey plans. There was discussion about roads, access and native title. <sup>78B(2) of the RTI AC</sup> responded to the native title questions and gave a summary of future acts (in relation to native title) and other relevant issues.

#### Transfer/Consultation process

All participants had been provided with information folders which Colleen went through, explaining what the information was for and where it could be found. She also invited people to keep a record of this and future meetings, in the notebooks provided, and also to record any impressions, thoughts or feelings in words, drawings or song, or any other creative way, about the significance of the land transfer, and to maybe present them at the Handover Celebration.

#### Timeline

An 8-month calendar, from September 2006 to April 2007 was included amongst the resources. Colleen pointed out that, all being well, the Handover could take place before the end of April 2007. She said that the first step in the transfer/consultation process was being taken today, at this meeting. If the survey plans were registered by mid-October, as advised by Rockhampton Office, the Office of Parliamentary Council (OPC) could then be requested to draft the regulation to make the land transferable under the Aboriginal Land Act 1991. Once the land had been regulated, say by about the 25th November 2006 and provided that the Grantee Acceptance Forms had been completed, the nominated trustees could be advertised. Advertisements could be placed in the Koori Mail (a fortnightly publication) on 13th December and in other regional newspapers and indigenous radio station 4US. Objections would close about 11th January 2007. Therefore, the next meeting could be held in late January/early February 2007, after school, holidays. At that meeting, any objections received would be dealt with, and matters such as Aboriginal names for the land, a name for the Land Trust, as well as planning for the Handover Ceremony, would be discussed. Another meeting would be held possibly in February, to work on the constitution . The draft consultation report would also need to be presented at a meeting. After one more meeting, the Handover could possibly be held in March 2007. (Hence the calendar to April 2007).

### **ALA Fact Sheet**

The Aboriginal Land Act Fact Sheet was mentioned. Colleen emphasized that, in the case of the Great Keppel Island, the land would be transferred. The section on claimable land did not apply, and would lapse at the end of 2006.

### **Information Booklet**

Colleen also went through the Information Booklet in some detail and suggested that people refer to it for information about matters such as part 3 of the Aboriginal Land Regulation which deals with land trusts, the powers and responsibilities of trustees and a model constitution

### The Journey toward Handover

Using a power point presentation, Colleen then provided an overview of the major steps in the ALA consultation/transfer process and summarised the issues which needed to be covered:

Release

- Identification of the land to be transferred;
- Native title issues
- The Aboriginal Land Act 1991 (ALA)
- The Aboriginal Land Regulation 1991
- The rights and responsibilities of trustees
- The nomination of trustees
- Land trusts
- Rules/constitution
- Handover Ceremony/Celebration
- First Land Trust Meeting

People would also be invited to propose names, or a name, for the parcels of land, a name for the Land Trust, a draft consultation report would be circulated for comment by nominated trustees and then the Final Report, recommending the appointment of trustees, would be sent to the Minister.

Colleen said that the land at Great Keppel Island would be declared by regulation to be transferable under s 12(e) of the ALA, and that it would be granted for the benefit of Aboriginal people without a claim being made. It becomes Aboriginal land (within the meaning of the ALA) when it is transferred to Aboriginal grantees, who automatically become incorporated as a Land Trust.

The ATSILAB team was acting on behalf of the Minister who, before appointing people as grantees, is required, by S 28(3) of the ALA to consult with, and consider the views of Aboriginal people particularly concerned with the land. Aboriginal people particularly concerned with the land are: people connected to the land by Aboriginal tradition

people who live on or use the land

people who live on or use the neighbouring land

# The Aboriginal Land Act 1991 (ALA)

A summary of the sections of the ALA as they apply to the transferable land at Great Keppel Island was presented by Colleen, using a power point display. Some of the main points made:

- The laws of the state apply to Aboriginal land (S26(1)
- The land is held by the grantees for the benefit of Aboriginal people and their anc estors nd descendants (S27)
- Minister appoints trustees and may remove or suspend trustees
- Minister must consult with and consider views of Aboriginal people particularly concerned with the land and
- Minister must, as far as practicable, act in a way that is consistent with any Aboriginal tradition applicable to the land concerned. (S28)
- When the deed is handed over, the land becomes Aboriginal land that is transferred land (S32)

Aspects of S(39) – Dealing with transferred land, were emphasized, particularly the sections dealing with the granting of leases and licences and the need for trustees to consult with the people particularly concerned with the land before granting an interest in the land, or consenting to the creation of a mining interest or entering into an agreement. S 35(b) says that Aboriginal people need to be able to express their views, and to be in agreement with, any proposals, and S35(c) requires that they be given at least one month's notice of the trustees' intentions. Colleen

said that these sections could be especially important for the trustees and the land at Great Keppel Island.

The section of the ALA dealing with "Reservations" - S42 and S43 were also pointed out. Minerals and petroleum found on land anywhere in Australia, including Aboriginal Land, belong to the state.Jim Sloan said that royalties would be paid, and an Indigenous Land Use Agreement (ILUA) could be entered into, if minerals were found on Aboriginal land.

Forest products can also be reserved to the state. In reply to a question from Frances Gala about sandalwood, Chris Doherty advised that she had a good relationship with the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and that a permit could be obtained to use resources such as sandalwood.

Jim Sloan spoke briefly on ALA Review.

# The Aboriginal Land Regulation 1991

Using power point presentation, Colleen spoke about the Regulation, especially about Part 3, which deals with Land Trusts.

Topics covered included:

- The formation of land trusts (Division 1)
- Grantees (Division 2)
- Trust property (Division 3)
- Compliance requirements (Division 4)

Part 5 - Decision Making Process was also discussed.

### Lunch Time Feast

Following the Lunch time feast, a video "the Aboriginal Land Act and the Torres Strait Islander Land Act, 1991", was shown

Colleen then suggested that a good remedy for after-lunch drowsiness might be some entertainment. Participants responded in song, led by Bessie Parsons and followed by a beautiful rendition of "Pearly Shells" by 78B(2) of the RTI Act which had everyone singing along.

### Nomination of Trustees

The process of nominating trustees was summarized. Colleen said that the Minister appoints trustees, but the people particularly concerned with the land nominate them. There was discussion about the process which includes the nomination, acceptance and advertising of trustees and dealing with any objections. The issue of who should be nominated was also discussed.

<sup>78B(2) of the RTI AC</sup>spoke on cultural process.

Bob Muir advised that the Woppaburra people had decided that each family group would nominate people to be trustees for land at Keppel Island when it becomes transferable. Colleen confirmed that this was a very good way of choosing trustees.

Release

<sup>78B(2) of the RTI A</sup> asked the ATSILAB Team to leave the meeting room to allow the participants to have private discussion.

Upon ATSILAB Team return, Colleen encouraged the meeting participants to talk amongst family groups to decide on Trustees overnight.

The meeting closed at about 5pm.

The Kgari Dancers performed cultural dances, at sunset, before another BBQ feast was held.

Kathy Mann extended an invitation to all to come to a special ceremony at Damon Point on Sunday morning, where the ashes of her late mother would be scattered on the beach.

# Meeting Opened Day 2 - Sunday 17 September, 2006

#### Welcome and Opening

Bob Muir as Chairperson extended a welcome to all attendees on the second day of the meeting, acknowledging the presence of 78B(2) of the RTI Act as elders and direct descendants. 78B(2) of the RTI Act as elders and direct descendants.

#### Nominated Trustees

Colleen again summarized the process of nominating trustees. Colleen said that the Minister appoints trustees, but the people particularly concerned with the land nominate them. There was discussion about the process which includes the nomination, acceptance and advertising of trustees and dealing with any objections.

The issue of who should be nominated was also discussed. Bob Muir advised that the Woppaburra people had decided that each family group would nominate their people to be trustees for land at Great Keppel Island and each family group would have one collective vote. Participants at the meeting unanimously agreed that they would like to proceed to nominating trustees in their family groups.

A representative from each family group called out their nominations for grantees and these names were recorded by ATSILAB Officer, Vanessa Francis-Smith. Grantees were then asked to come up individually to sign their Trustee Acceptance Form. There were 40 nominated grantees.

The following list is the Nomination of Trustees for Great Keppel. These grantee names were reviewed and checked for spelling with all the Trustees in attendance. Trustee Acceptance Forms were signed by those present. Certain family representatives took responsibility for having the forms signed and returned by nominated trustees who were not present at the meeting.

Colleen congratulated all the grantees and thanked them for accepting the responsibilities of being a trustee. She also thanked and congratulated all participants for their wisdom in choosing the trustees.

She then spoke briefly on the process for regulation of the land as transferable, which could take about 4-6 weeks after the plans are registered around mid October. In that timeframe, the land could be regulated about mid December.

# **Process for Objections**

Colleen explained that, when the land was regulated as transferable, the names of the nominated trustees would be advertised. This was so that people would know who the nominated trustees were, and if they thought that somebody should not be a trustee, they could object. Somebody could also "object" by saying that somebody who should be a trustee, had not been nominated. The following suggestions were obtained from participants regarding where best to advertise the nominated trustees to gain the most coverage of Aboriginal people particularly concerned with the land.

- Fraser Coast Chronicle
- Cairns Post
- Koori Mail
- Rockhampton Bulletin
- Daily Mercury Mackay
- Radio 4US

Colleen said that, allowing for a 28 day objection period, the next meeting could be considered for around January 2007.

# Till we meet again

Colleen explained how the Land Trust would be incorporated, and asked if everyone might think about ideas for the name of the Trust, considering that it must contain the words 'Land Trust' in the name.

She also spoke about the name to be on the Deed, which would be preferably a traditional or Woppaburra name for Great Keppel. She understood that names had already been discussed/chosen, but said that these would need to be confirmed/endorsed by at a formal meeting.

Colleen asked people to think about the following important matters before the next meeting:

- Land Trust name
- Names for the Land
- Constitution
- Planning for the Handover where, when, who, what, how

The first milestone would be noted by sending a letter when the plans are registered to keep individuals informed of the progress.

# Welcome and Opening

Christine Doherty and Bob Muir opened the meeting and congratulated everyone on the land becoming regulated, and ready to be handed over.

Bob spoke to the meeting about protocols regarding other clans business and the decision making process, whereby there would be one vote per family and each family were to nominate a spokesperson and central contact.

Christine Doherty introduced the legal advisors, <sup>78B(2) of the RTI Act</sup> absent) who is an Indigenous Barrister who will work on a pro bono basis. <sup>78B(2) of the RTI Act</sup> ill be the other legal advisor. Christine Doherty asked for a show of hands to endorse the two legal advisors. Majority agreed.

Christine Doherty also asked in future if the families could each pick one person to represent them at meetings, as it is too expensive to get forty trustees together all the time. Glenice asked if it could be two people from each group, one younger person and one elder. Majority agreed.

Christine Doherty asked for a minute's silence to honour the elders and people we have lost.

Christine Doherty and Bob were thanked for all their hard work and devotion in getting the Woppaburra people together.

Joh-Ann Coates asked Christine Doherty what <sup>78B(2) of the RTI Act</sup> specialty was. Christine replied that <sup>78B(2) of</sup> has worked in many different fields, which include: Indigenous legal services, land tenure, Native Title, youth services, Government.

Christine Doherty also acknowledged the legal expertise within the trustees.

Christine Doherty put to the meeting that there are a lot of decisions to be made today and could everyone please go through the appointed family member to speak. Christine Barney raised the issue of everyone having a say at the meeting, as everyone is excited and happy to be here. All agreed.

Discussion was had about who would chair today's meeting. It was unanimously agreed that <sup>78B(2)</sup> of the RTI AC would chair the meeting on behalf of the Woppaburra people.

Agenda for the meeting was written up on the board as follows:

- 1. Minutes
- 2. Progress report NRW
- 3. Transfer (Objection, Name of Land, Name of Land Trust, Constitution, Handover)
- 4. Where to from here

Christine Barney questioned if there was a consultation report, and if so, where is it? Jim Sloan responded that currently there is a draft report and that after all the steps have been completed the report will be updated and distributed to the trustees for comment before submission to the Minister for approval.

#### Previous Minutes

The minutes from the previous meeting at Scrub Hill were distributed for comment and approval. <sup>78B(2) of</sup> ppened up to the floor for comments on the minutes. These are as follows:

- Christine Barney asked if NRW could check the names of attendees as there were some double ups.
- Frances Gala brought to everyone's attention that on page 5 of the previous minutes, nominated trustees are to have one vote per family.
- Christine Barney asked it 78B(2) of the RTI Act

  taken off the minutes, as they were not in attendance at the Scrub Hill meeting.
- taken off the minutes, as they were not in attendance at the Scrub Hill meeting. Janice Reilly referred to 78B(2) of the RTI nomination as a trustee and confirmed that 78B(2)
- Janice Reilly referred to 700(2) of the RTT nomination as a trustee and confirmed that 700(2)
   78B(2) o had stood down as a trustee and Janice has taken her place.
- Jim Sloan advised that there had been a few changes to the original trustees that were nominated at Hervey Bay and that advertisement of trustees is not compulsory, but rather a policy.
- Lucy Richards asked if <sup>78B(2) of the RTI Act</sup> could be added as a trustee.
- Christine Doherty responded that <sup>78B(2) of the RTI A</sup> wasn't nominated as a trustee.
- Glenice suggested that the family should discuss it at morning tea.
- <sup>78B(2) of the RTI Act</sup> questioned the timeline in the minutes for the handover for March 2007 and enquired if the rumour of a handover before Christmas was true.
- Jim Sloan responded saying that the regulation had come through earlier than predicted and that the timelines can be changed.

- Gordon Barney questioned if the people could claim North Keppel?
- Open discussion was had on land tenure.
- 78B(2) of the RTI Act questioned the surrounding land's tenure type on Keppel.
- Jim responded that is it made up of lease land and State land.
- It was asked if the process, which was used to nominate the trustees at the last meeting, be documented into the minutes before they are passed.
- Christine Doherty and Bob Muir to provide advice to NRW on work they had undertaken.

Bob did a traditional welcome to country (Jagerra): "thank you to the traditional owners of this land for letting us do our business here on their country, thank you".

#### Progress Report

Jim Sloan gave an update on the progress since the last meeting. The regulation has been completed and the land was regulated on 26 October 2006. The advertisement of trustees had been done, and as a result one objection has been lodged in writing.

#### Transfer

#### Objection

The person objecting is sch4p4(6) Personal information , and Jim has spoken with sch4p on the phone. sch4p4(6) Pe was objecting to the process and not being consulted. sch4p claims to be Darumbal.

## MOTION made by 78B(2) of the RTI Act

"We the Woppaburra people and trustees, disregard the objection of sch4p4(6) Personal inform sch4p4(6) Per as we do not acknowledge sch4 as a Woppaburra person".

Seconded: Frances Gala. Carried: Unanimously

Christine Doherty asked what NRW would do in reply to this objection?

Jim Sloan replied that he would contact <u>sch4p4(6)</u> Pein the next week and inform sch4 of the outcome from today's meeting, and that he would also have to reply to <u>sch4</u> in writing.

#### Name of the land

Jim explained that the name of the land could be put on the deed if the trustees would like that.

Christine Doherty and Bob Muir suggested to the group that the five parcels of land be named after the five family names. Chris and Bob had done a ballot allocating each parcel against a family name. Some agreed to this, and some didn't.

The meeting was opened up for discussion on the naming of the land.

Aunty Bessie thanked Chris and Bob for doing a wonderful job so far.

Vanessa Francis of NRW advised the group that to individually name each parcel of land would require five separate deeds to be created for each parcel.

The meeting decided that it should only be one deed and that the local name would be "Woppaburra".

MOTION made by Christine Barney "That the name of the land on the deed be Woppaburra". Seconded: Linette Van Issum Carried: Unanimously

Christine Doherty suggested that the people have a rock with a plaque to always remember the five family members so the future children don't forget the past. Christine also moved a motion that the group should have a vision statement.

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Bernie gave an example of an Indian statement. "We don't inherit the land, we borrow it from our children"

Glenice also made a suggestion of, "the land owns us".

#### Name of Land Trust

MOTION made by Linette Van Issum. "The Land Trust name would be Woppaburra Land Trust". Seconded: Vanessa Kirk. Carried: Unanimously

Christine Doherty gave an update on the draft constitution that Bob and her had started, and would like <sup>78B(2)</sup> of the RTI Act to have a look.

Christine Barney and Frances Gala have also worked on a draft constitution.

It was agreed that the five different family groups choose 3 people to be part of the working group to draft up the constitution as follows:

#### Welcome and Opening

78B(2) of the RTI Act opened the meeting and welcomed everybody to Butchula country.

Colleen thanked <sup>78B(2) of the RTI</sup> and acknowledged and paid respect to the traditional owners of the land. She thanked the Butchula people for holding the meeting on their land at Scrub Hill, and acknowledged and paid respect all the elders present. She thanked everybody for coming, introduced the ATSILAB team members and also acknowledged the assistance of all those who had helped with the planning and arrangements for the meeting.

By consensus among participants, Bob Muir was appointed to chair the meeting.

In response to a request from the floor, he outlined his efforts, over the last 13 years, to have the land at Great Keppel Island handed over to Aboriginal people. Glenice Croft pointed out the work also done by others in the past –KILAC, Linette van Issum. Following animated discussion from the floor, Colleen responded acknowledging the great contributions made by several people over many years. Participants were requested to focus on what they were there to achieve – to be informed about the transfer of land at Great Keppel Island under the *Aboriginal Land Act 1991*, the consultation process and the nomination of Aboriginal trustees for the land.

#### Identification of the Land

Colleen indicated the five parcels of land – Lot 50 on DP 190989, Lot 51 on DP 190992, Lot 29 On DP 190994, Lot 53 on DP190990, Lot 52 on DP 190991 to be transferred, on a large map. She explained that DP meant Deposited Plan as the survey plans had not yet been registered. She said that Rockhampton Office had advised that the survey plans would be registered on 16<sup>th</sup> October, and explained that the opening and closing of roads, and the native title notification process which that involved, had slowed down the registration of the survey plans. There was discussion about roads, access and native title. <sup>78B(2) of the RTI Affect responded to the native title questions and gave a summary of future acts (in relation to native title) and other relevant issues.</sup>

#### Transfer/Consultation process

All participants had been provided with information folders which Colleen went through, explaining what the information was for and where it could be found. She also invited people to keep a record of this and future meetings, in the notebooks provided, and also to record any impressions, thoughts or feelings in words, drawings or song, or any other creative way, about the significance of the land transfer, and to maybe present them at the Handover Celebration.

#### Timeline

An 8-month calendar, from September 2006 to April 2007 was included amongst the resources. Colleen pointed out that, all being well, the Handover could take place before the end of April 2007. She said that the first step in the transfer/consultation process was being taken today, at this meeting. If the survey plans were registered by mid-October, as advised by Rockhampton Office, the Office of Parliamentary Council (OPC) could then be requested to draft the regulation to make the land transferable under the Aboriginal Land Act 1991. Once the land had been regulated, say by about the 25<sup>th</sup> November 2006 and provided that the Grantee Acceptance Forms had been completed, the nominated trustees could be advertised. Advertisements could be placed in the Koori Mail (a fortnightly publication) on 13th December and in other regional newspapers and indigenous radio station 4US. Objections would close about 11th January 2007. Therefore, the next meeting could be held in late January/early February 2007, after school, holidays. At that meeting, any objections received would be dealt with, and matters such as Aboriginal names for the land, a name for the Land Trust, as well as planning for the Handover Ceremony, would be discussed. Another meeting would be held possibly in February, to work on the constitution. The draft consultation report would also need to be presented at a meeting. After one more meeting, the Handover could possibly be held in March 2007. (Hence the calendar to April 2007).

#### **ALA Fact Sheet**

The Aboriginal Land Act Fact Sheet was mentioned. Colleen emphasized that, in the case of the Great Keppel Island, the land would be transferred. The section on claimable land did not apply, and would lapse at the end of 2006.

#### **Information Booklet**

Colleen also went through the Information Booklet in some detail and suggested that people refer to it for information about matters such as part 3 of the Aboriginal Land Regulation which deals with land trusts, the powers and responsibilities of trustees and a model constitution

#### The Journey toward Handover

Using a power point presentation, Colleen then provided an overview of the major steps in the ALA consultation/transfer process and summarised the issues which needed to be covered:

Identification of the land to be transferred;

- Native title issues
- The Aboriginal Land Act 1991 (ALA)
- The Aboriginal Land Regulation 1991
- The rights and responsibilities of trustees
- The nomination of trustees
- Land trusts
- Rules/constitution
- Handover Ceremony/Celebration
- First Land Trust Meeting

People would also be invited to propose names, or a name, for the parcels of land, a name for the Land Trust, a draft consultation report would be circulated for comment by nominated trustees and then the Final Report, recommending the appointment of trustees, would be sent to the Minister.

Colleen said that the land at Great Keppel Island would be declared by regulation to be transferable under s 12(e) of the ALA, and that it would be granted for the benefit of Aboriginal people without a claim being made. It becomes Aboriginal land (within the meaning of the ALA) when it is transferred to Aboriginal grantees, who automatically become incorporated as a Land Trust.

The ATSILAB team was acting on behalf of the Minister who, before appointing people as grantees, is required, by S 28(3) of the ALA to consult with, and consider the views of Aboriginal people particularly concerned with the land. Aboriginal people particularly concerned with the land are: people connected to the land by Aboriginal tradition

people who live on or use the land people who live on or use the neighbouring land

#### The Aboriginal Land Act 1991 (ALA)

A summary of the sections of the ALA as they apply to the transferable land at Great Keppel Island was presented by Colleen, using a power point display. Some of the main points made:

- The laws of the state apply to Aboriginal land (S26(1)
- The land is held by the grantees for the benefit of Aboriginal people and their anc estors nd descendants (S27)
- Minister appoints trustees and may remove or suspend trustees
- Minister must consult with and consider views of Aboriginal people particularly concerned with the land and
- Minister must, as far as practicable, act in a way that is consistent with any Aboriginal tradition applicable to the land concerned. (S28)
- When the deed is handed over, the land becomes Aboriginal land that is transferred land (S32)

Aspects of S(39) – Dealing with transferred land, were emphasized, particularly the sections dealing with the granting of leases and licences and the need for trustees to consult with the people particularly concerned with the land before granting an interest in the land, or consenting to the creation of a mining interest or entering into an agreement. S 35(b) says that Aboriginal people need to be able to express their views, and to be in agreement with, any proposals, and S35(c) requires that they be given at least one month's notice of the trustees' intentions. Colleen

said that these sections could be especially important for the trustees and the land at Great Keppel Island.

The section of the ALA dealing with "Reservations" – S42 and S43 were also pointed out. Minerals and petroleum found on land anywhere in Australia, including Aboriginal Land, belong to the state.Jim Sloan said that royalties would be paid, and an Indigenous Land Use Agreement (ILUA) could be entered into, if minerals were found on Aboriginal land.

Forest products can also be reserved to the state. In reply to a question from Frances Gala about sandalwood, Chris Doherty advised that she had a good relationship with the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and that a permit could be obtained to use resources such as sandalwood.

Jim Sloan spoke briefly on ALA Review.

#### The Aboriginal Land Regulation 1991

Using power point presentation, Colleen spoke about the Regulation, especially about Part 3, which deals with Land Trusts.

Topics covered included:

- The formation of land trusts (Division 1)
- Grantees (Division 2)
- Trust property (Division 3)
- Compliance requirements (Division 4)

Part 5 - Decision Making Process was also discussed.

#### Lunch Time Feast

Following the Lunch time feast, a video "the Aboriginal Land Act and the Torres Strait Islander Land Act, 1991", was shown

Colleen then suggested that a good remedy for after-lunch drowsiness might be some entertainment. Participants responded in song, led by Bessie Parsons and followed by a beautiful rendition of "Pearly Shells" by 78B(2) of the RTI Act which had everyone singing along.

#### Nomination of Trustees

The process of nominating trustees was summarized. Colleen said that the Minister appoints trustees, but the people particularly concerned with the land nominate them. There was discussion about the process which includes the nomination, acceptance and advertising of trustees and dealing with any objections. The issue of who should be nominated was also discussed.

78B(2) of the RTI A spoke on cultural process.

Bob Muir advised that the Woppaburra people had decided that each family group would nominate people to be trustees for land at Keppel Island when it becomes transferable. Colleen confirmed that this was a very good way of choosing trustees.

<sup>78B(2)</sup> of the RTI AC asked the ATSILAB Team to leave the meeting room to allow the participants to have private discussion.

Upon ATSILAB Team return, Colleen encouraged the meeting participants to talk amongst family groups to decide on Trustees overnight.

The meeting closed at about 5pm.

The Kgari Dancers performed cultural dances, at sunset, before another BBQ feast was held.

Kathy Mann extended an invitation to all to come to a special ceremony at Damon Point on Sunday morning, where the ashes of her late mother would be scattered on the beach.

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#### Meeting Opened Day 2 - Sunday 17 September, 2006

11.00 am

#### Welcome and Opening

Bob Muir as Chairperson extended a welcome to all attendees on the second day of the meeting, acknowledging the presence of Aunty Ruth and <sup>78B(2)</sup> of the RTI At as elders and direct descendants. <sup>78B(2)</sup> of the RTI Ac then opened the meeting with prayer.

#### Nominated Trustees

Colleen again summarized the process of nominating trustees. Colleen said that the Minister appoints trustees, but the people particularly concerned with the land nominate them. There was discussion about the process which includes the nomination, acceptance and advertising of trustees and dealing with any objections.

The issue of who should be nominated was also discussed. Bob Muir advised that the Woppaburra people had decided that each family group would nominate their people to be trustees for land at Great Keppel Island and each family group would have one collective vote. Participants at the meeting unanimously agreed that they would like to proceed to nominating trustees in their family groups.

A representative from each family group called out their nominations for grantees and these names were recorded by ATSILAB Officer, Vanessa Francis-Smith. Grantees were then asked to come up individually to sign their Trustee Acceptance Form. There were 40 nominated grantees.

The following list is the Nomination of Trustees for Great Keppel. These grantee names were reviewed and checked for spelling with all the Trustees in attendance. Trustee Acceptance Forms were signed by those present. Certain family representatives took responsibility for having the forms signed and returned by nominated trustees who were not present at the meeting.

Colleen congratulated all the grantees and thanked them for accepting the responsibilities of being a trustee. She also thanked and congratulated all participants for their wisdom in choosing the trustees.

She then spoke briefly on the process for regulation of the land as transferable, which could take about 4-6 weeks after the plans are registered around mid October. In that timeframe, the land could be regulated about mid December.

#### **Process for Objections**

Colleen explained that, when the land was regulated as transferable, the names of the nominated trustees would be advertised. This was so that people would know who the nominated trustees were, and if they thought that somebody should not be a trustee, they could object. Somebody could also "object" by saying that somebody who should be a trustee, had not been nominated. The following suggestions were obtained from participants regarding where best to advertise the nominated trustees to gain the most coverage of Aboriginal people particularly concerned with the land.

Colleen said that, allowing for a 28 day objection period, the next meeting could be considered for around January 2007.

#### Till we meet again

Colleen explained how the Land Trust would be incorporated, and asked if everyone might think about ideas for the name of the Trust, considering that it must contain the words 'Land Trust' in the name.

She also spoke about the name to be on the Deed, which would be preferably a traditional or Woppaburra name for Great Keppel. She understood that names had already been discussed/chosen, but said that these would need to be confirmed/endorsed by at a formal meeting.

Colleen asked people to think about the following important matters before the next meeting:

- Land Trust name
- Names for the Land
- Constitution
- Planning for the Handover where, when, who, what, how

The first milestone would be noted by sending a letter when the plans are registered to keep individuals informed of the progress.

#### Thanks and Acknowledgements

Colleen thanked everyone for attending and accomplishing so much yesterday and today. She said that the Woppaburra people had achieved a record, in nominating trustees at the first meeting, before the land had even been regulated. They were on track to have a Handover in March 2007, and this would be another record – a Handover within seven months of the first meeting. and wished them "safe home".



It is recommended that the Minister note:

- the status of the arrangements for the handover of a deed of grant for parcels of land on Great Keppel Island under the Aboriginal Land Act 1991 (ALA);
- the draft timelines and agenda for the handover ceremony; and
- the draft speech notes for the ceremony.

#### BACKGROUND

On 16 February 2007, the Minister directed that a deed of grant be prepared over parts of Great Keppel Island and that certain Aboriginal people be appointed as grantees.

Under the ALA, a deed of grant takes effect upon its delivery to the grantees. A proposed handover ceremony, as outlined under Key Issues, will facilitate this requirement of the ALA.

#### **KEY ISSUES**

- Following consultation with the Minister's office, a ceremony where the Minister will present Aboriginal grantees with a deed of grant and unveil a plaque is to be held on 4 April 2007. The handover will take place within the Great Keppel Island Resort complex commencing at 10.30am, followed by a barbeque lunch.
- Approximately 300 people are expected to attend the celebration. Attendees will include the grantees, representatives of the local indigenous and wider community and senior officers of the Queensland Government. The grantees and the department have invited the following dignitaries:

I am aware that the Woppaburra people and their descendants have occupied and continued to visit the Keppel Islands from the time of the islands formation about 5000 years ago.

- I thank you for inviting me to be here today as I consider it a pleasure and a great honour to be with you on this historic occasion.
- Today, I am here on behalf of the Queensland Government and the people of Queensland to hand over a Deed of Grant for 5 parcels of land on Great Keppel Island to a group of trustees who will hold the land in trust for all Aboriginal people connected to the land.
- This ceremony is the culmination of a land transfer process under the *Aboriginal Land Act 1991* that grants inalienable freehold title to the land. In handing the land over the Queensland Government

is recognising and respecting the traditions, observances, customs and beliefs of Aboriginal people as custodian of the land.

- When I hand over the deed to the land, the Woppaburra Land Trust will become its owner and it will be the responsibility of the Land Trust members to deal with the land in such a way that it will benefit present and future generations of Aboriginal people.

#### RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that the Minister:-

- 1. note that the handover of lands on Great Keppel Island under the ALA is likely to occur in March 2007; and
- indicate if he would be available to officiate at the handover ceremony. If so, could he provide a suitable date in March 2007 when he is available (preferably Friday 23 or Friday 30 March 2007).

#### BACKGROUND

A briefing note has been forwarded to the Minister seeking his endorsement to direct that a deed of grant be prepared over 5 parcels of unallocated State land on Great Keppel Island and appoint Aboriginal grantees (the Woppaburra people) to a Land Trust (see CTS 00758/07).

Upon receiving Ministerial direction, Governor-in-Council approval to issue the title will be sought. This is an administrative process that takes three weeks. It is anticipated that the title will be ready to be handed over to the grantees in mid March 2007.

#### **KEY ISSUES**

- Given the location of the lands and the availability of accommodation a long lead time is required to
  organise this handover.
- At meetings of the nominated grantees on 18 November 2006 and 2 February 2007 it was asked if the Minister would be officiating at the handover and, could the handover take place on any Friday in March 2007 – preferably 23 or 30 March.
- On 6 February Christine Doherty and Bob Muir, spokespersons for the Woppaburra people emailed the Minister's office asking if the Minister was available to officiate at the handover ceremony and if so, could he commit to a date. They also stated in the email they would be inviting the premier to attend.

#### PROPOSED ACTIONS

- That the Minister indicates whether he will be officiating at the handover ceremony.
- Departmental officers will continue to work with the nominated grantees on handover arrangements.

#### RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that the Minister:

1991 (ALA)

- 1. direct that a deed of grant be prepared over parts of Great Keppel Island; and
- 2. appoint Aboriginal grantees (the Woppaburra people) by signing Attachment A.

#### BACKGROUND

The ALA provides the process under which land can be transferred to a group of Aboriginal people as trustees, to hold the land for the benefit of Aboriginal people.

The Lands that can be transferred are:

- certain Aboriginal reserve land
- land in a deed of grant in trust for Aboriginal people (all the large Aboriginal communities in Queensland are deeds of grant in trust land);
- Aurukun Shire lease land;
- Mornington Island Shire lease land;
- land declared by a Regulation to be transferable land (the Act specifies what land may be declared available for transfer).

Under the transfer process, NRW officers, on behalf of the Minister for Natural Resources and Water, consult with Aboriginal people who are particularly concerned with the land at issue. The product of these consultations then serves as the basis of a recommendation to the Minister that the land be transferred to a specified group who are considered the most appropriate representatives of the Aboriginal people. If the Minister agrees with the recommendation, the representatives will become the grantees of the land, who will act as trustees for Aboriginal people and their ancestors and descendants.

In appointing grantees, the Minister must, as far as practicable, act in a way that is consistent with any Aboriginal tradition applicable to the land.

#### **KEY ISSUES**

- Five parcels of unallocated State land on Great Keppel Island totalling 170.86 hectares in area were regulated as transferable land under the ALA on 27 October 2006. The land, located approximately 50 km north east of Rockhampton, has cultural heritage values for the Aboriginal people connected to the land, the Woppaburra people.
- The subject lands are described as lot 50 on SP190989, lot 51 on SP190992, lot 52 on SP190991, lot 53 on SP190990 and lot 29 on SP190994 parish of Keppel, county of Livingstone, total area of 170.86 hectares and are described in Attachments B and C.

Date: 22/1/07

- Indigenous Services officers conducted a consultation process on the Minister's behalf to identify grantees to the land. The Department facilitated two formal meetings, as well as a number of other informal meetings and discussions with smaller groups. At the first meeting held in Hervey Bay on 16-17 September 2006 the responsibilities of trustees under the Act and Regulation were explained, as were the processes of nominating and appointing grantees to become trustees of the land. On the second day meeting participants nominated forty people, as listed on Attachment A, to represent the five main families connected to the land under Aboriginal tradition.
- The accompanying Report of Consultation and Recommendation details the consultation and research undertaken to satisfy the requirements of the ALA and provides the basis for the recommendation.
- All necessary title pre-issue requirements under the ALA for transfer of the subject land have been
  met.
- The transfer is clearly contemplated by the Act and does not affect native title.

#### PROPOSED ACTIONS

- Upon receiving Ministerial direction, Governor-in-Council approval to issue the title will be sought, and
  it is anticipated that the title will be handed over to the grantees in March 2007.
- Departmental officers will liaise with the Aboriginal grantees concerning arrangements for the handover. Further advice will be provided to the Minister in relation to handover arrangements.
