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# INTRODUCTION

The purpose of this profile is to present an economic overview of the Capricorn Coast and Rockhampton area which includes the Rockhampton Regional Council and Livingstone Shire Council areas. The profile provides information and statistics on various economic and related indicators such as demographics, employment, business and industry, building activity, tourism, education, transport and affordability. This profile has been developed by Capricorn Enterprise.

Demographic information provided in this publication consists of the latest estimated resident population, changes to population and age characteristics, and population projections.

Information on employment is provided by way of employment figures by industry and occupation, labour force statistics and mean taxable income.

The business and industry sections include information on business counts, production and activity in the agriculture and mining sectors, and data on Queensland's commodity exports as it relates to the region.

The building activity section gives a concise summary of the number and value of building approvals in the region.

Information on education provided in this profile includes the number of primary and secondary schools in the region, information on activity at Central Queensland University, vocational education and training, as well as 2016 and 2021 Census figures on the qualifications of the region's population.

Road and air travel statistics are all reported in the transport section.

Finally, details of the region's liveability are provided in the form of retail price information, fuel prices and house prices for both purchase and rental markets.

Note: Results from the ABS 2021 Census of Population and Housing have been released progressively in 2022 and 2023. This profile has been updated following the Census release.

Australia's latest Census was held in August 2021 and included new questions while some previous questions were not included. Data collected in the Census helps government, businesses and organisations to make informed decisions.

# **Capricorn Coast and Rockhampton**

The Capricorn Coast and Rockhampton area comprises the two local government areas of Rockhampton Regional Council and Livingstone Shire Council. It is within the Central Queensland Statistical Area Level 4 (SA4) and covers a total area of 18,356 km² and accounts for 1.1% of the state's area.

# **Climate**

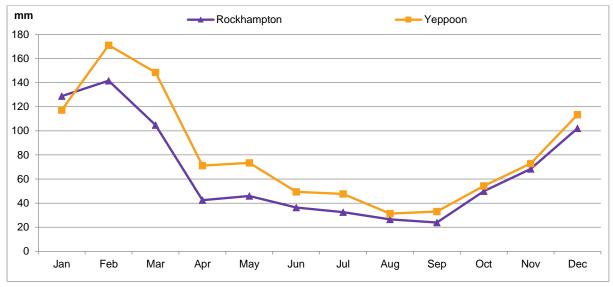
The Capricorn Coast and Rockhampton area enjoys a subtropical climate with wet summers and low winter rainfall. The highest mean monthly maximum temperature in Rockhampton is in December, 32.2°C. Yeppoon's highest mean monthly maximum temperature is in January, 29.4°C. The lowest mean monthly minimum temperature in Rockhampton is 9.8°C in July and 12.2°C in Yeppoon in July.

Both Yeppoon and Rockhampton have their highest mean monthly rainfall in February (171.3mm and 141.6mm respectively). Rockhampton's lowest mean monthly rainfall is in September, with just 23.9 mm, whereas Yeppoon's lowest mean monthly rainfall is in August, with 31.3 mm.

# **Estimated Resident Population**

The estimated resident population of the Capricorn Coast and Rockhampton area at 30 June 2022 was 124,675 persons, 2.3% of the total Queensland population. Between 30 June 2017 and 30 June

2022, the population in the Capricorn Coast and Rockhampton area increased by an average of 1.0% per annum, a lower growth rate than Queensland, which increased by an average of 1.6% per annum.

While the population of the region increased between 2017 and 2022, population change varied significantly by Statistical Area Level 2 (SA2). The fastest population growth over the five-year period occurred in Yeppoon SA2 (an average of 2.3 % per annum), followed by Rockhampton Surrounds -North SA2 and Parkhurst – Kawana SA2 (both an average of 1.7% per annum).

#### **Population**

Longer-term historical estimated resident population data from the Australian Bureau of Statistics indicate that the population of the Capricorn Coast and Rockhampton area has increased since 1991. The population increased from 89,668 persons in 1991 to 124,675 persons in 2022. This was an increase of 35,007 persons at an average annual growth rate of 1.3%.

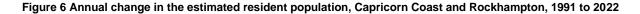
Annual population change for the Capricorn Coast and Rockhampton area has varied considerably between 1991 and 2022. The largest population change was between 2011 and 2012, with an increase of 2,603 persons. The greatest population decline occurred between 2015 and 2016 with a decrease of 333 persons.

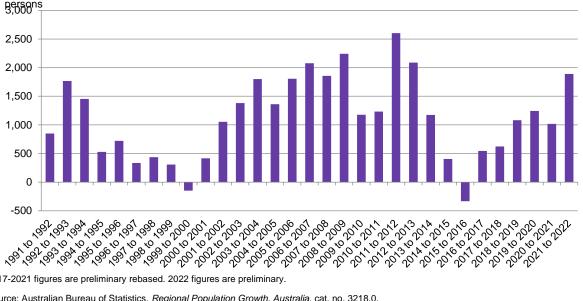

# **Age Characteristics**

Data from the Australian Bureau of Statistics indicate that the Capricorn Coast and Rockhampton area, as at 30 June 2022, had a greater proportion of persons aged 0 to 19 years, 55 to 69 years and 75 years and over when compared with Queensland. The largest percentage difference between the Capricorn Coast and Rockhampton area and Queensland was those persons aged 60 to 64 years (0.7 percentage points higher) and persons aged 10 to 14 years and 60 to 64 years (0.6 and 0.7 percentage points higher respectively).

Between 2017and 2022, the greatest increase in population in the Capricorn Coast and Rockhampton area was persons aged 60 to 64 years (1,260 persons), followed by persons aged 70 to 74 years (1,147 persons) and 35 to 39 years (1,085 persons). The greatest decrease in population in the area was persons aged 20 to 24 years (644 persons) and 0 to 4 years (471 persons). As at 30 June 2022,

the median age for the Capricorn Coast and Rockhampton area was 39.1 years compared to 38.6 years in Queensland.

Figure 7 Estimated resident population by age, as a percentage of the population, Capricorn Coast and Rockhampton area and Queensland, 2022(a)

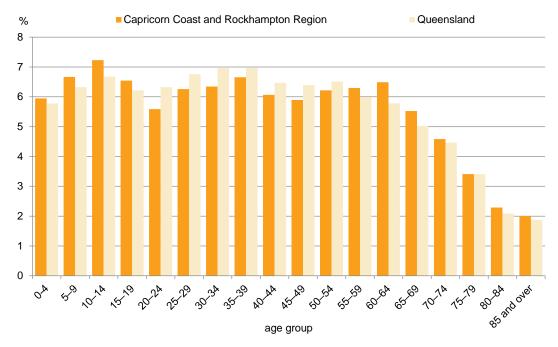
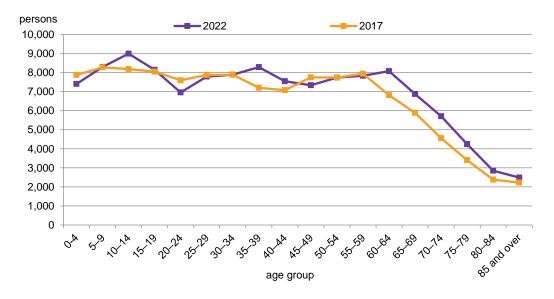


Figure 8 Estimated resident population by age, Capricorn Coast and Rockhampton, 2017 and 2022 (a)

# **Population Projections**

Population projections published by Queensland Treasury and Trade, 2023 edition, indicate that the population of the Capricorn Coast and Rockhampton area will increase to 159,370 persons by the year 2046. The Region is projected to have a higher rate of growth (1.0%) than the Central Queensland SA4 (0.8%) but slower rate than Queensland (1.4%). It is predicted the region will grow on average by 1,463 persons per year between 2021 and 2046.

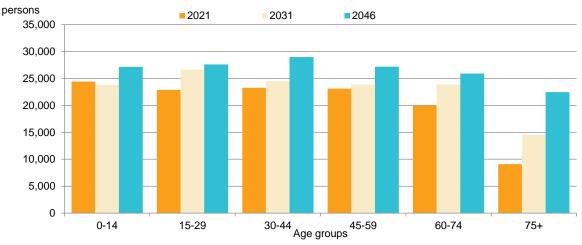

All age groups are projected to experience growth; however, the greatest percentage growth is being projected in the 60 to 74 years (29.8%) and over 75 years age groups (147.1%).

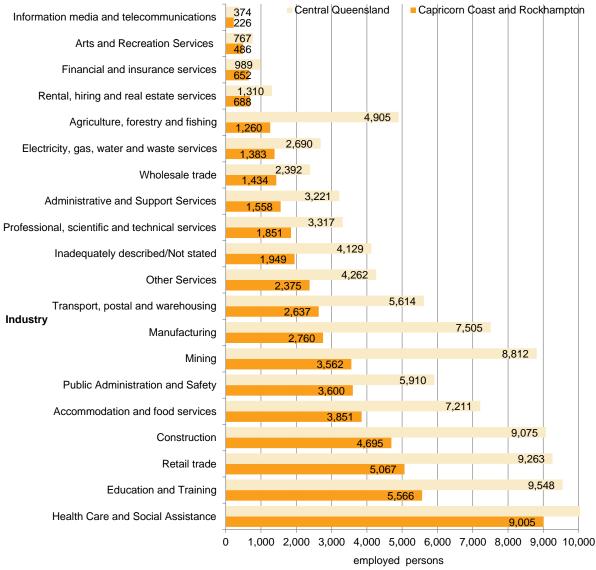

# **Employment by Industry**

At the time of the 2021 Census, health care and social assistance was the largest employing industry in the Capricorn Coast and Rockhampton area, accounting for 9,005 (16.5%) of the region's employed workforce. Other significant industries included education and training (10.2%), retail trade (9.3%) and construction (8.6%).

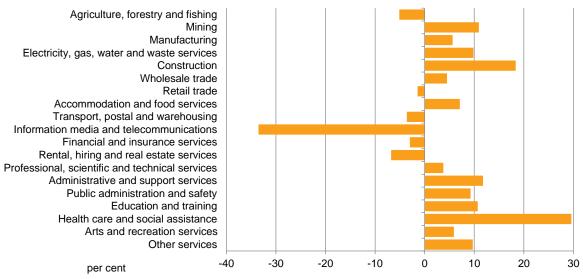

Health care and social assistance experienced the highest percentage growth of employed persons by industry between 2016 and 2021 at 29.6%, followed by construction (18.4%), and administrative and support services (11.8%). Persons employed in information media and telecommunications experienced the largest decline (–33.5%). Between 2016 and 2021, health care and social assistance had the greatest increase in the number of persons employed of all industries (2,056 persons). Information media and telecommunications had the largest decrease in persons employed of all industries (–114 persons).

Figure 10 Percentage change in employed persons (a) (b) by industry (c), Capricorn Coast and Rockhampton, 2016 to 2021



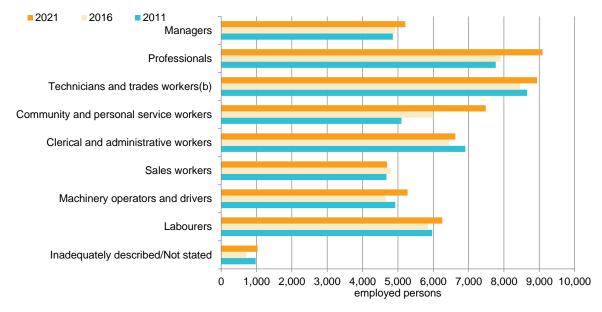

## **Occupation**

At the time of the 2021 Census, the largest occupational group of residents in the Capricorn Coast and Rockhampton area was professionals (9,089 persons), followed by technicians and trades workers (8,938 persons) and community and personal service workers (7,489 persons). With the exception of clerical and administrative workers, occupations experienced growth between the 2011 and 2021 censuses, although sales workers contracted between 2016 and 2021. The greatest increases were community and personal service workers (46.8%) and professionals (17%).

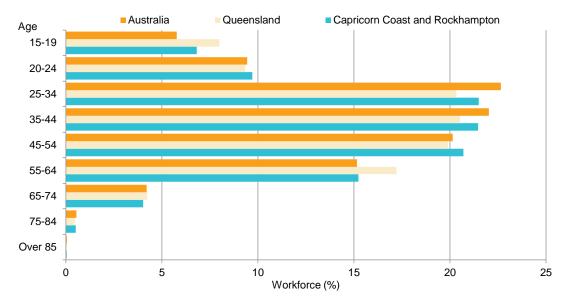

# Age

The workforce profile for the Capricorn Coast and Rockhampton area in 2021 showed a higher proportion of workers in the younger age groups (15-19 years) compared to the National average.

The proportion of workers in the 55-64 years age group was significantly lower in the Capricorn Coast and Rockhampton area than the State average.

Figure 12 Labour force by age group, 2021

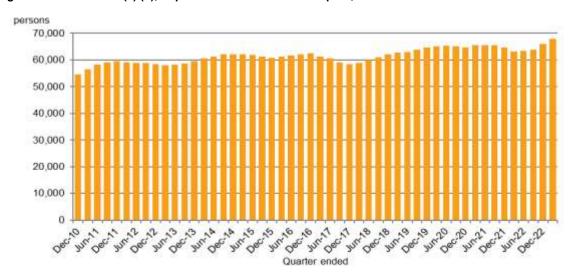

#### Labour force

The total estimated labour force in the Capricorn Coast and Rockhampton area for the June quarter 2023 was 68,943 persons. Between the December quarter 2010 and June quarter 2023, the average annual growth rate of the labour force in the Capricorn Coast and Rockhampton area was 2.1%.

#### Unemployment

Synthetic estimates from the Australian Government National Skills Commission indicate the unemployment rate in the Capricorn Coast and Rockhampton area in the June quarter 2023 was 3.8%, a 0.9 percentage points decrease from the same quarter in 2022.

The unemployment rate for the region in the June quarter 2023 was 0.1 percentage points higher than the rate for Queensland.

The estimated number of unemployed persons in the Capricorn Coast and Rockhampton area for the June quarter 2023 was 2,642 persons. This was an increase of 236 unemployed persons from the previous quarter.

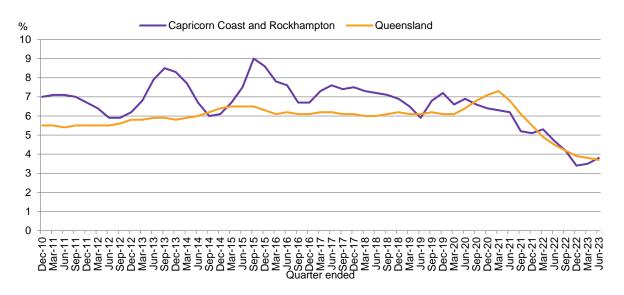
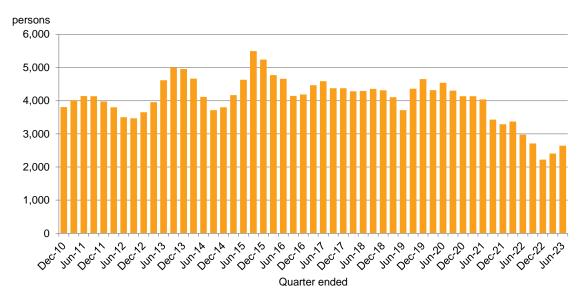


Figure 15 Unemployed persons (a) (b), Capricorn Coast and Rockhampton, December quarter 2010 to June quarter 2023 (c)

# **Journey to Work**

At the time of the 2021 Census, 49,077 people worked in the Capricorn Coast and Rockhampton area. Of these persons, 96.1% resided in the region, while 3.8% (1,869 persons) resided elsewhere. Four hundred and forty-six persons resided in Sunshine Coast Regional Council and worked in the Capricorn Coast and Rockhampton area, while 160 persons resided in other states and territories and worked in the region.

At the time of the 2021 Census, 54,604 employed persons resided in the Capricorn Coast and Rockhampton area. Of these persons, 86.3% worked within the region, while 9.6% (5,267 persons) worked elsewhere. This included 1,972 persons who worked in the Central Highlands Regional Council area, 1,288 persons who worked in the Isaac Regional Council area and 349 usual residents of the region who worked in other states and territories.

#### **Estimates of Personal Income**

Estimates of personal income show that the mean total personal income (excluding Government pensions and allowances) in the Capricorn Coast and Rockhampton region for the 2019-20 financial year was \$65,914. The mean employee income in the Capricorn Coast and Rockhampton area for the 2019-20 financial year was \$66,396. This was \$3,987 more than the mean employee income for Queensland (\$62,409).

Between the financial years 2015 and 2020, the mean total personal income (excluding Government pensions and allowances) in the Capricorn Coast and Rockhampton area increased by \$5,524 (9.1%). This was less than Queensland for the same period (\$5,285 or 9.0%).

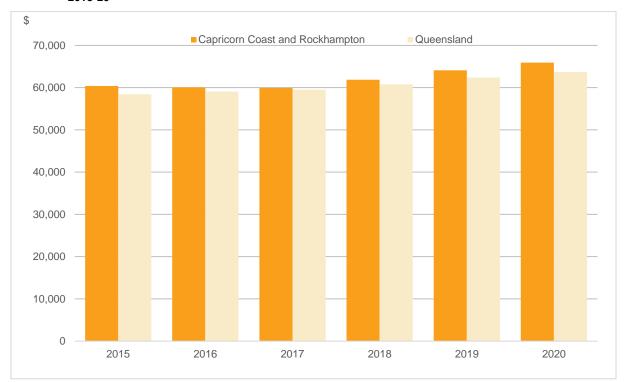


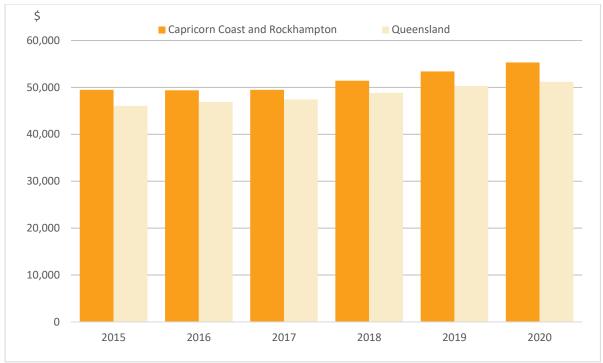
Figure 16 Mean income from wages and salaries (a), Capricorn Coast and Rockhampton area and Queensland, 2015-20

The mean measures the total income divided by the number of income earners. Because income is not equally distributed, as there are generally more low income earners with fewer high income earners, using medians can be a more accurate reflection of income data.

The median total personal income (excluding Government pensions and allowances) in the Capricorn Coast and Rockhampton area for the 2020 financial year was \$55,316. This was \$4,119 more than the median total income for Queensland (\$51,197). Between the financial years 2015 and 2020, the median total personal income (excluding Government pensions and allowances) in the Capricorn Coast and Rockhampton area increased by \$5,833 (3.6%). This was less than Queensland for the same period (\$5,145 or 1.8%).

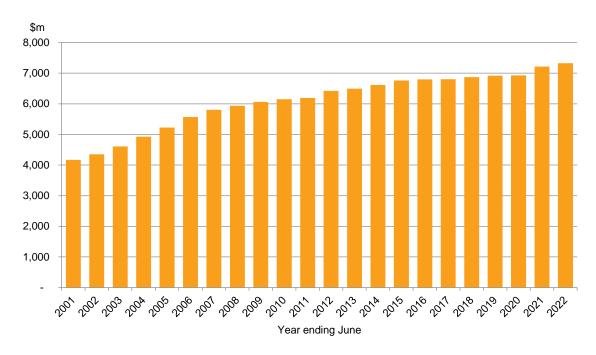

# **Gross Regional Product**

The gross regional product (GRP) in the Capricorn Coast and Rockhampton Region was estimated to be \$7,324 million in 2021-22, an increase of 1.6% from the previous year.

In 2021-22, the Queensland Resources sector provided \$661m in wages paid directly to 4,314 full time employees and \$654m for goods and services purchased locally in the Capricorn Coast and Rockhampton Region.

Over the ten years to 2021-22, the Capricorn Coast and Rockhampton Region GRP recorded an average annual growth of 1.4%. From 2001-02 to 2021-22, the average annual growth rate was 3.4%.

The industry composition of the Capricorn Coast and Rockhampton Region's economy based on estimates of value-added shows health care and social assistance is the prominent industry in the region, accounting for 13.1% of value added in 2021-22 up 4.1 percentage points from 2011-22. Construction, at 9.7%, and electricity, gas and water supply and construction at 8.8%, were the next largest contributors to region's economy. The largest change in composition was observed in mining, up 4.9 percentage points from 2011-2012. Financial and insurance services recorded the largest fall in its share of value added, down 2.1 percentage points, followed by manufacturing, down 1.8 percentage points.

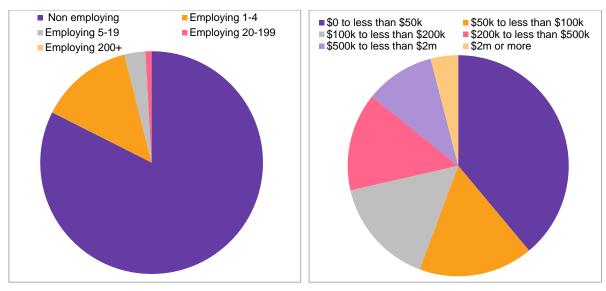

# **Agricultural Production**

Agriculture, forestry and fishing accounted for 15.1% of all businesses registered in the Capricorn Coast and Rockhampton area as at 30 June 2021. Over four-fifths (84.2%) of these businesses were non-employing and almost two-fifths (39.0%) had a turnover of less than \$50,000 per annum.

Figure 18 Counts of businesses by turnover in agriculture, forestry and fishing industry, Capricorn Coast and Rockhampton, as at 30 June 2021



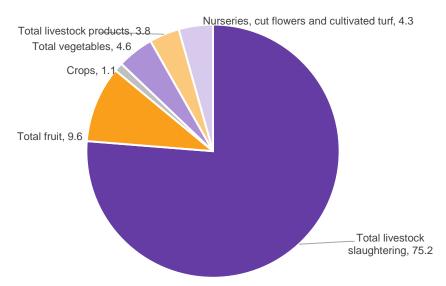

In 2020-21, livestock slaughtering made up 75.2% of the Capricorn Coast and Rockhampton area's total value of agricultural production. Fruit crops were the second highest agricultural commodity (9.6%), followed by vegetables (4.6%).

The total gross value of agricultural production in the Capricorn Coast and Rockhampton area was \$239.8 million, or 16.8% of the Central Queensland SA4 total. The most valuable agricultural product in the region for 2020-21 was cattle and calves slaughtered (\$178.9 million). Cattle and calves slaughtered accounted for 16.9% of the Central Queensland SA4 gross agricultural production.

# **Exports from Queensland Ports**

Merchandise goods exported from Queensland ports totalled \$121,886 million in 2021-22, an increase of 105.0% from the previous financial year. Exports from the Gladstone Port in the Central Queensland region totalled \$43,774 million in 2021-22, an increase of 124.0% from the previous year. Gladstone Port exports were 35.9 % of the total value of Queensland's merchandise export.

In dollar value terms in 2021-22, combined confidential items was the main type of commodity exported from the Gladstone Port (48.0%), followed by coal (45.5%). The specialisation ratio reflects the importance of a commodity exported from the region compared with Queensland as a whole. The major commodity with the highest specialisation ratio for Gladstone Port was combined confidential items (2.4) followed by inorganic chemicals (2.0).

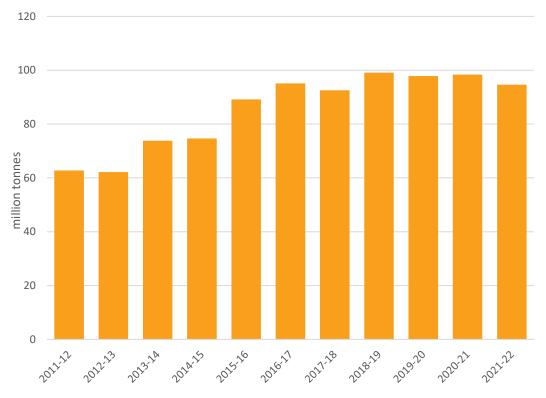

In 2021-22, Queensland commodities exported overseas from Gladstone Port increased 523.8% (\$102.345.5 million) from 2020-21. # Median house, unit/townhouse and urban vacant land prices

The median house price in the 12 months to the end of September 2023 was \$405,000 in the Capricorn Coast and Rockhampton Region. While the Rockhampton (R) median price was less than that of Mackay and Cairns Regional Councils, and Townsville and Brisbane Cities, the Livingstone (S) median price was higher than Cairns, Gladstone, Mackay and Townsville council areas.

The median unit and townhouse price in the 12 months to the end of September 2023 was \$337,000 in the Capricorn Coast and Rockhampton Region. These median prices were higher than in Gladstone, Central Highlands, Mackay, Cairns local government areas. The median unit/townhouse price increased 0.7% in Rockhampton (R) and 4.6% in Livingstone (S) in the 12 months to the end of September 2023.

The median vacant urban land price in the 12 months to the end of September 2023 was \$230,000 in Capricorn Coast and Rockhampton Region. The median price increased by 16.2% in the region, increased by 20.9% in Livingstone (S) and remained steady 0.0% in Rockhampton (R).

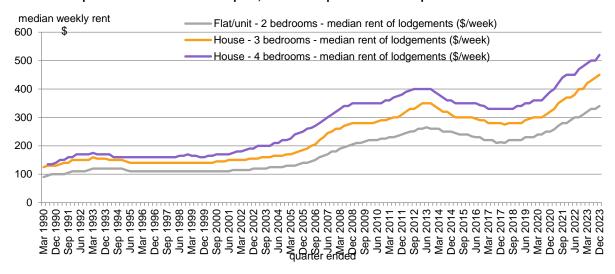

# **Building Approvals**

In the 12 months ending 31 December 2023, there were 407 new residential dwelling approvals in the Capricorn Coast and Rockhampton area. Yeppoon SA2 accounted for 44.7% of all new residential dwelling units in the region, followed by Parkhurst - Kawana SA2, 14.5% and Emu Park, 7.1%. Total residential building value in the year ending December 2023 for the region was \$238.7 million and accounted for 1.3% of residential building value in Queensland. Total building value for the Capricorn Coast and Rockhampton area decreased by 3.2% between the year ended December 2022 and the year ended December 2023.

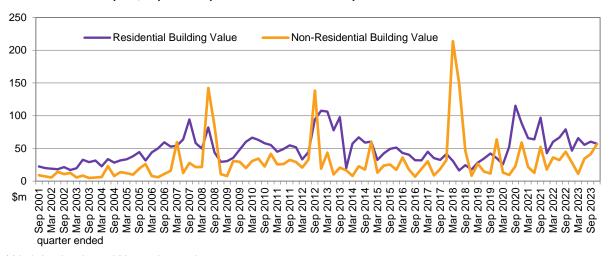

Figure 22 Value of residential and non-residential building approvals (a) (b), Capricorn Coast and Rockhampton, September quarter 2001 to December quarter 2023



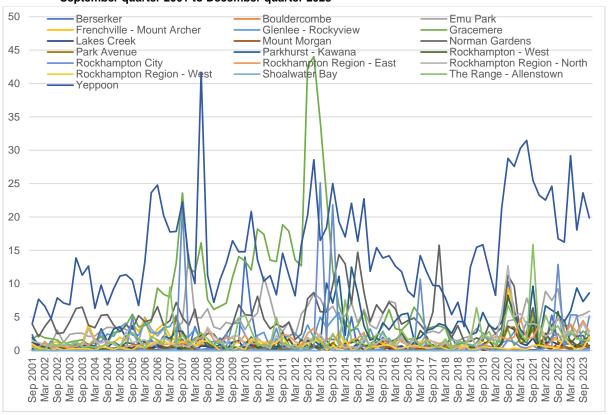

# **Apprentices and Trainees**

The industry with the largest increase in apprentice and trainee numbers between the June quarter 2021 and June quarter 2022 was other services (98 persons), followed by health care and social assistance (57 persons).

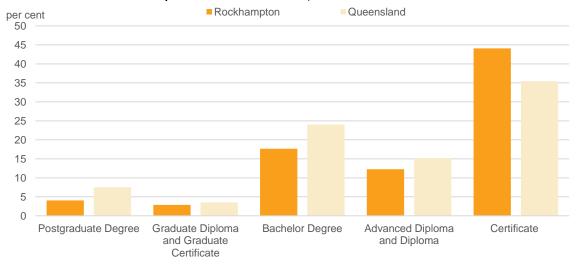

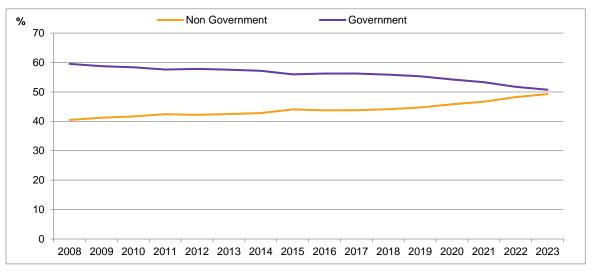

#### Roads

Five major roads provide access to and from Rockhampton. In 2020, the Yeppoon Road at Iron Pot Creek had the highest average daily traffic movements (11,373 vehicles), while the Emu Park Road had the lowest average daily traffic movements (4,739 vehicles).

Of the five locations selected, the Bruce Highway north of Scrubby Creek had the highest number of heavy vehicles (1,520). The Yeppoon Road at Iron Pot Creek had the highest number of light vehicles (10,476) while the Emu Park Road had the highest percentage of light vehicle traffic (88.7%).

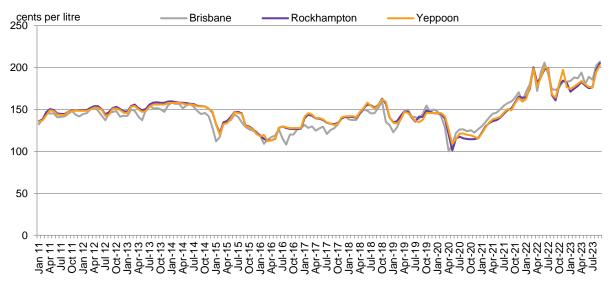

# **Fuel Prices**

In the Capricorn Coast and Rockhampton Region, between January 2011 and September 2023, most average monthly unleaded petrol prices were higher than Brisbane Metro; however, averages since June 2020 have frequently been lower in Rockhampton and Yeppoon. Rockhampton and Yeppoon average monthly unleaded petrol prices increased to 205.3 and 202.5 cents per litre respectively in September 2023, the highest averages recorded.

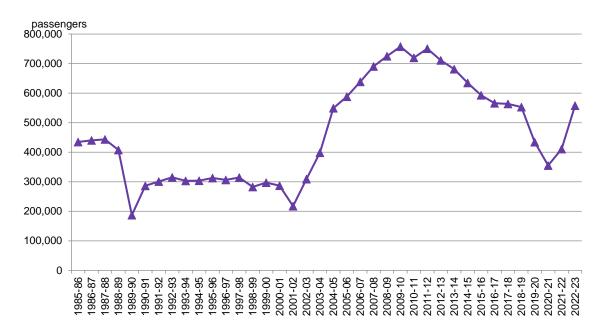
Figure 27 Average monthly fuel prices, unleaded petrol, Rockhampton, Yeppoon and Brisbane Metro, January 2011 to September 2023

#### **Air Travel**

Rockhampton Airport is the major air transport facility servicing the region. Expanded facilities at the airport cater for both domestic and international airlines. During 2022-23, a total of 557,583 passengers passed through Rockhampton Airport. This was an increase of 35.7% from the 411,024 passengers in 2021-22 and reflects the continued recovery of domestic travel from COVID-19 closures with passenger numbers being similar to 2018-19. The average annual rate of change in passenger movements between 2013-14 and 2022-23 was a decrease 1.8%, or an average of 12,380 passengers per year.

#### **Quick stats**

#### **Retail Prices**

A survey of retail prices in Queensland in 2015 compared the prices of a range of household goods and services between Brisbane and 27 regional centres. Priced items were grouped into ten categories representing different household expenses. Together these constitute the all groups index. Regional centres have an index relative to Brisbane, which was given an index of 100. Rockhampton had an All Items index of 96.6, or 3.4% less expensive than Brisbane over all items.

The housing index included median weekly rents for dwellings, electricity and other household fuels. Housing accounts for 22.2% of the average Queensland household expenditure. Housing was 21.3% less expensive in Rockhampton and 21.4% and 34.5% less expensive in Emerald and Gladstone respectively than Brisbane.

The food and non-alcoholic beverages index included bread and cereal products, dairy and related products, fruit and vegetables, dining-out meals and takeaway, meat and seafood and non-alcoholic beverages. This category accounts for 16.3% of the average Queensland household expenditure. For food and non-alcoholic beverages, only Rockhampton in the Fitzroy SA4 recorded lower prices

than Brisbane (18.1%). Gladstone was the dearest centre surveyed in the region, with prices for these goods 12.7% higher than Brisbane.

The transportation index included unleaded and diesel fuel, mechanic charges, taxi fares, vehicle registration, roadside assistance membership, CTP insurance and driver licences and sundries such as car batteries, motor oil, tyres and spark plugs. In the average Queensland household, transportation accounts for more than one tenth (11.4%) of expenditure. In Rockhampton, the transportation index was 2.4% higher than Brisbane while it was 0.6% and 1.2 %lower in Gladstone and Emerald respectively.

The insurance and financial services index included household contents insurance, comprehensive motor vehicle insurance, financial services and deposit and loan facilities. Rockhampton was significantly higher than Brisbane and all other centres with an index of 138.0 or 38.0% above the Brisbane region.

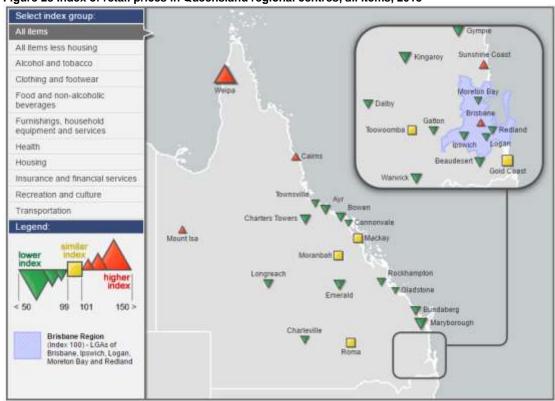

# **Boat Registrations**

In June 2020, there were 10,361 recreational boats registered in the Capricorn Coast and Rockhampton postcode areas, an increase of 1.5% from 2019. The majority of boats registered had a length between three and four metres (29.4%) while the largest percentage growth was in boats between 8 and 8.9 metres (4.7%).
